




Draft NRP/EIS Public Comments: Background

- ◆ TVA has actively solicited and incorporated a broad range of public input as part of the NRP to ensure that stakeholder viewpoints, concerns, and aspirations are adequately addressed
 - TVA conducted two public scoping opportunities as part of the draft NRP, resulting in 685 comments specific to natural resources management. The chart (right) shows the top 10 issue categories along with the corresponding number of comments (% of 685 total received)
 - TVA also met with various agencies throughout the Valley to provide them with an overview of the NRP development process and timeline as well as to facilitate an open discussion to identify key trends and challenges facing agencies today



TVA continues to utilize the Regional Resource Stewardship Council (RRSC) as the key stakeholder review group for the NRP

Draft NRP/EIS Public Comments: Key Themes and Findings (to date)

Below is a summary of the public comments received to date:

Topic	Highlights
Reservoir Lands Planning	<ul style="list-style-type: none">— This has been the primary focus of comments received to date (both at public meetings and online)— Consider potential role in supporting a nationwide network of biological corridors and conservation focused lands plan (particularly those following riparian zones)— Various lands planning and zoning allocation comments on Pickwick Reservoir (Memphis), including:<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Rezone the Pickwick Pines Marina site for use as a public park or for natural resource conservation▪ Modify TVA’s Land Policy to allow rezoning of tracts outside of the normal planning process for natural resource conservation and sensitive resource management (less industrial or commercial recreation)
NRP Implementation	<ul style="list-style-type: none">— Maintain existing and expand relationships throughout the Valley (e.g., partnerships, public outreach)— Protect and maintain lands for future generations (preserve non-renewable resources)
Other Considerations	<ul style="list-style-type: none">— Climate change: Coordinate efforts to mitigate the effects of climate change on lands planning (e.g., flooding, freeze events, and forestation)
